President Scott, of the Union Iron Works, of San Francisco, which built the battleship Oregon and is building the Ohio, which President McKinley is going to see launched, who is now in Washington, said of the President's trip to the Pacific coast: "We are going to have a big time when the Ohio is launched. The people out our way are all anxious to see the President, and they will give him a great reception. We don't often have a President as a visitor on the Pacific coast, and we are going to make the most of our opportunity. If Mr. McKinley does not have a pleasant time, it will be because the people of California have forgotten the art of entertaining, and we would not like to think we had."

If the muddy condition of the roads continues now is the time to work them. Any material placed on the roads while in such a state will become firmly bedded and when the highways dry off the surface will be hard and soon become smooth. If gravel is placed on roads after they become hard it very soon crushes and makes more mud. The roads should be rounded so that water will not lie on them. This is one of the prime requisites in good road making, and if done even poor material will make a fairly good road.

We have received the Yale University prospectus of the Summer School of Forestry, which will hold its sessions at Grey Towers this summer opening July 8th and continuing eight weeks. It sets forth substantially what was published in the Press last week regarding the school and its objects. It is embellished with two illustrations one of the cottage near the Towers which is for the school and the other the house corner of Broad and Hartford streets which it denominates the Milford Village Library.

The Philadelphia Press strongly condemns the proposition to make Carbon and Wayne separate Judicial Districts and to place Monroe and Pike together. It thinks such an arrangement wholly unnecessary and that it is only a scheme to make places for more judges, for which there is no need. Carbon by her population is entitled to a judge but Wayne and Pike together barely have the requisite number. It thinks Monroe could well be attached to Carbon and this district left as it now is.

During the recent thaw, and rain, many of the sidewalks in town were in an almost impassable condition. It would seem that the attempts to make decent walks of gravel, where they are much used have been fully demonstrated to be fallacious. On the main streets flagging should be used. It would be cheaper in the long run and would enable people to travel without such serious inconvenience as they now experience.

Senator Frye, who has again been honored by a unanimous election to be President pro tem of the Senate, says he will devote a portion of the Congressional recess to preparing a new shipping bill, which he will use his best efforts to put through at the next regular session of Congress, in order to give American shipping the chance it deserves to keep pace with the American industries that now lead the world.
