SANDYSTON.

I see by the papers that work has commenced on the valley road from Stroudsburg to Bushkill, Pa. Now I am in hopes that the builders of this road may see the importance of extending the line to Port Jervis, 20 miles further on. In that case the people of this section would be benefited.

As I write, I hear the rattle of milk cans, showing that some of our farmers are patronizing the creamery. If the creamery at Montague is a paying institution, there is no reason why this one should not pay as well; and if the farmers do not patronize it they have themselves to blame. It is a new thing here and many are so inclined to run their farm in the rut of their fathers that it is hard for them to get out of that rut, unless they see the dollars in it.
