WATRES' FRIENDS HAPPY. The Scranton Man's Candidacy For Governor Gaining Strength.

Scranton, Pa., Oct. 4.—The friends of Colonel Louis A. Watres are in a happy frame of mind. From all sections of the state active party workers in the Republican ranks have signified their intention to assist him in securing the Republican nomination for governor.

"Widespread interest in next year's campaign for the successor to Governor Stone will be created by the announcement of former Lieutenant Governor Watres, of Lackawanna, that he is a candidate for the Republican nomination. AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION PROPOSED TO THE CITIZENS OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth in General Assembly met, that the following be proposed as amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in accordance with the provisions of the eighteenth article thereof.

AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION PROPOSED TO THE CITIZENS OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA. SECTION I. Qualifications of Electors. Every male citizen twenty-one years of age, possessing the following qualifications shall be entitled to vote at all elections, subject however to such laws requiring and regulating the registration of electors as the General Assembly may enact.

AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION PROPOSED TO THE CITIZENS OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA. SECTION II. Uniformity of Election Laws. All laws regulating the holding of elections by the citizens or for the registration of electors shall be uniform throughout the State, but laws regulating and requiring the registration of electors may be enacted to apply to cities only, provided that such laws be uniform for cities of the same class.
