With sincere regret we realize that Rev. C. B. Carpenter has closed his parish work in Milford and departed to his new field of labor. His genial manner and unselfish cordiality have endeared him to all of us and we wish, for both himself and family in their adopted home every spiritual blessing with abundant success.
The Rev. Edgar M. Smead, at the request of the session of the First Presbyterian church of Fort Jervis, delivered the charge to the people on Wednesday evening at the installation of their new pastor, the Rev. Francis E. Smith. We bid this neighboring sister church and their pastor's most sincere and affectionate Godspeed in the work which has so auspiciously begun.
Last Tuesday evening was the final meeting of the pastor's catechism class until next fall. This work has been highly enjoyable by most, if not all, the class but on account of the warm weather and the vacations that are coming it has been deemed wise to discontinue the class for the present. It is hoped, however, that the children may study the remaining questions by themselves and be ready for a review when we meet again as a class.
It is with undigged pleasure that we record the fact that last Sunday evening our congregation reached the high water mark. The attendance was the largest we have had since last July. Now with a few exceptions this congregation was made up from our own people. Would it not be inspiring if such a large number attended our services each Lord's day? I think we would all do better work and be happier in it. Let us try and see.

Reformed Church Notes.
(By Rev. J. E. Meyer of Montague.)
The classis of Orange met in regular spring session at Newburgh April 16. The proposed amendments in the forms for ordination of ministers, infant baptism and ordination of elders and deacons were rejected.
All the ministers of the classis were present.
The classical sermon was preached by Rev. Andrew J. Meyer from text, Matt. 12:42; subject, "Unconscious Influence." The missionary address was given in his usual happy vein by Rev. John W. Conklin, field secretary for foreign missions. Mr. Conklin had been a missionary in India for seven years and this personal experience gave his words added power.
Revs. T. H. McKenzie and J. C. Forbes of Fort Jervis and Rev. J. L. Stillwell, formerly of Montague, were elected delegates to general synod. Rev. A. J. Meyer was elected a delegate to the particular synod of New York which met May 8 and 7.
On Sabbath, April 20, Frank Kerr and Harry Cortright were ordained deacons in the Montague Reformed church. For the first time in the history of the two Reformed churches, Montague and Hainesville, there is a full consistory.
The need of a new organ in the Reformed church has long been felt, but the problem has been how to obtain the means. The young people met and decided to give an entertainment, the proceeds of which were to form a nucleus for an organ fund. The entertainment will be given in the Montague church on Wednesday evening, May 14, but if stormy the next fair evening. From all reports the entertainment will be far better than anything our community has ever enjoyed and the cordial cooperation and support of our friends is earnestly desired. All friends of the congregation and all who are interested in promoting the welfare of the church are cordially invited to attend. The admission price is: Adults 50c; children under fifteen 30c. This will be followed by the serving of ice cream and cake in the basement of the church for 15c.

Why Meats Are High.

The American Agriculturalist recently gave a very interesting picture showing the reason for advance in price of meats. It compares by per cent. the increase in population in this country from 1890 to 1900 and the increase in flocks and herds. The population increased 31.8% while the increase in stock was as follows: Beef, cattle, 13%; milk cows, 3.8%; sheep, 11%; and swine, 5.5%. This shows that supply is not keeping pace with home demand and this is quite aside from our steadily expanding foreign markets for meat products. Population has increased the past ten years much faster than the number of cattle, hogs and sheep, in fact nearly twice as fast, roughly speaking, as the number of meat and dairy animals. Farmers should be encouraged by these facts and pay more attention to the live stock industry which eventually would correct the discrepancy and would also be profitable for them. It takes about three years to fit a steer for market so the matter cannot be accomplished in a few days.
