 The superintendent of schools of  
 the state of New York has ordered  
 the withholding of all state school  
 money from schools where the Stars  
 and Stripes are not flying during  
 school hours, and several schools  
 have thus been deprived of such  
 money. The laws of New Jersey  
 order that all schools shall have a  
 flag but only two schools have flags  
 in this township.  
 Montague appears to be a paradise  
 for thieves and anything goes that  
 happens to be loose. Last week  
 Frank Black missed a fine cow from  
 his pasture and at last accounts she  
 has not been heard of. Smoke houses  
 seem to have the call from the light  
 fingered gentry up there.

 Once in a while our legislature

 went into effect that only veterinary  
 doctors could doctor your sick horse  
 or cow and if any of our local doctors  
 took charge of a neighbor's sick animal  
 he is liable to fine and imprison-  
 ment. What a fool law this is.

 Newton on his contract at Sparta.  
 They will leave for their work early  
 this week.
