

**AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION**  
 PROPOSED TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF PENNSYLVANIA IN GENERAL ASSEMBLY MEETING HELD AT HARRISBURG, PENNSYLVANIA, PUBLISHED BY ORDER OF THE SECRETARY OF THE COMMONWEALTH IN PURSUANCE OF ARTICLE XVIII OF THE CONSTITUTION.

**A JOINT RESOLUTION**

Proposing an amendment to section ten of article one of the Constitution, so that the discharge of a jury for failure to agree or other necessary cause shall not work an acquittal.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following be proposed as an amendment to the Constitution, that is to say, that section ten of article one, which reads as follows:

"No person shall, for any indictable offense be proceeded against criminally by information, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger, or by order of the court for oppression or misdemeanor in office. No person shall, for the same offense, be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall private property be taken or applied to public use, without just compensation being first made or secured." Be amended so as to read as follows:

"No person shall, for any indictable offense, be proceeded against criminally by information, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger, or by order of the court for oppression or misdemeanor in office. No person shall, for the same offense, be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; but a discharge of the jury for failure to agree, or other necessary cause, shall not work an acquittal. Nor shall private property be taken or applied to public use, without authority of law and without just compensation being first made or secured."

**AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION**  
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**A JOINT RESOLUTION**

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in accordance with the provisions of the eighteenth article thereof:

Amendment.  
 Add at the end of section seven, article three, the following words: "Unless before such proposal is adopted, or local law shall have been first submitted to a popular vote, at a general or special election in the locality or localities to be affected by its operation, under an order of the court of common pleas of the respective county after hearing and application therefor, and shall have been approved by a majority of the voters at such election: Provided, That no such election shall be held until the date of court and before the same shall have been advertised for at least thirty (30) days in the locality or localities affected. In such manner as the court may direct."
