### SANDYSTON.

December will pass as a pretty cold month. There was 22 clear days, 3 cloudy and 4 partly cloudy. The highest temperature was 48° on the 20th, and the lowest 13° below zero on the 21st. Mean maximum temperature was 32.35-100. Mean minimum 10.32. Maximum set 35.58. Rainfall 2.53 inches and the snow fall 26 inches. It is hoped that the coldest part of the winter is over.
