The Auditor found that on Jan. 15, 1908, a county check for \$1,000, signed by Martin Hatton, W. H. Clune and H. R. Albright, Commissioners, was drawn in favor of Peter Blaher for services as County Auditor and incidentals expense. The Auditor found that Mr. Blaher was not entitled to pay for one day returning home after filing the report, and therefore should have been charged from bill and had same due the county from Martin Hatton, W. H. Clune and H. R. Albright, to wit:

The Auditor found that on Jan. 2, 1908, a county check for \$2,121, signed by W. H. Clune and W. H. Albright, was drawn in favor of A. J. Dewitt, Coroner, for services in inquest and viewing bodies of Cornelius Owsing, William Drink, Samuel Shuman, George W. Hubbard and Thomas Whitaker. The Auditor found that the said Coroner has charged in his said bill horse hire and guide in the amount of \$12, to which he is not entitled under the law, and also excessive mileage in the amount of \$1.50, leaving a balance due the county from the said A. J. Dewitt, coroner, of \$2,109.50.
The Auditor found that Treasurer Lohar received from the County of Wayne the balance of the expense of paint used on County bridges, in the amount of \$1.78 per gallon, as a matter of fact the County of Wayne paid for the paint \$1.39 per gallon, which would make the whole bill \$120.26, or \$122.48, if the share. Hence we find due the county from the County of Wayne the sum of \$122.48.
The Auditor found that Arthur M. Adams, fire warden, received on county check No. 457 the sum of \$12.42. As this bill filed by him totals \$24.18, we find the county is indebted to the said Arthur M. Adams for the sum of \$11.76.
The Auditor found that George Gregory received on county check No. 222 the sum of \$20 for hauling coal from Port Jervis. His bill filed totals for 1907. We therefore find that the county is indebted to the said George Gregory in the sum of \$20.

Time, to the Hundredth of a Second.
Of the many new devices that modern inventions has recently given to the world, perhaps there is no more ingenious contrivance than the electrical chronometer, the product of a Parisian brain, by means of which an automobile race can be timed even to the one-hundredth of a second.
One of these instruments is placed at the starting-point of the race and another at the finish, the two being connected by a charged wire. When the start has been made a current of electricity is immediately sent through the line, which deflects a needle, making a dot upon a paper on a revolving drum. At the finish another dot is made upon the paper; the exact time may then be discovered by means of the scale which connects these markings.
