TO TELL WHEN MEAT IS DONE

Scientific Device Worthy a Place in Every Kitchen.

Cooks are accustomed to cut into a plece of meat when cooking, to prod vegetables with a fork, and to use similar primitive methods of ascer taining the stage to which the roast ing or boiling process has advanced. The first really scientific device to measure the temperature inside a plece of cooking food has recently been invented in Copenhagen. Den-mark. It is called a "the mo needle." and consists of a thin metal tube, pointed at one end and containing a pointed at one end and containing a spring held in tension by an alloy melting at a specified temperature, which is that desired for cooking. The melting of this alloy releases the spring and shoots up a pin as a signal that the desired temperature exists in the interior of the food into which the "media" has the other terms.

In the interior of the book mice which the "needle" has been thrust. As the instrument is withdrawn, the pin is pushed down and held while the fusi-ble alloy "sets," when the devise is ready for use again.


