BOROUGH ORDINANCE NO. 48

Relating to digging or excavating in or upon any portion of any sidewalk, street or alley or public highway of this Borough without first having secured from the President of the Borough a written permit to do so, and the regulations governing the same, and to the issuance of such permits, and to the revocation of such permits, and to the imposition of a fine or penalty upon any person who violates any of the provisions of this ordinance.

BOROUGH ORDINANCE No. 49

Relating to the care of dogs in the Borough of Milford, imposing a tax or license on same, providing for collection thereof and penalties for non-compliance, and to the issuance of such licenses, and to the revocation of such licenses, and to the imposition of a fine or penalty upon any person who violates any of the provisions of this ordinance.

Advance of the Grainers. For a long time past scientific observations in various parts of the world have shown a tendency on the part of glaciers to retreat. This has been particularly noted in the Alps. Recent information indicates that a change may be at hand. At least, it has been found that since 1894 the Norway glaciers have begun to advance again. In 1907 this progression became general in Norway, the advance varying from 1 to 12 meters.

Camper's Charcoal Furnace. Every camper should have a deep tin or sheetiron bucket with a flat cover to use as a charcoal furnace in the tent on cold nights and rainy days. A row of small holes around the sides about two inches from the bottom to the line of holes with broken stones or sand. Make it a rule to scatter the embers every time an open fire is used, and gather this charcoal in the pocket and keep dry. Cooking can be done in the tent free from smoke and when a gentle heat all night is desired, put on the cover, leaving a small opening for draught. With this heater any camper can be comfortable, even under the most adverse circumstances.—G. J. G.
