Borough of Matamoras ORDINANCE NO. 26

Giving permission to the Matamoras Citizens Water Company, its successors and assigns to lay, repair and maintain water mains, water pipes, hydrants, shut offs, gates and meters through and under the avenues, streets and sidewalks owned by and within this Borough and to furnish water, for public and domestic use to the inhabitants thereof for pay and prescribing certain conditions and penalties.

Section 1. The council of the Borough of Matamoras does hereby enact that from and after the passage of this ordinance the Matamoras Citizens Water Company, its successors and assigns, a corporation organized and existing under the laws of this Commonwealth, be and they are hereby empowered to lay, repair and maintain water mains, water pipes, hydrants, shut offs, gates and meters through and under the avenues, streets and sidewalks, owned by and within the Borough of Matamoras, Pa., and to furnish water to the public and private consumers for pay, subject to the following regulations and conditions.

Section 2. That all mains or pipes laid, shall be at a depth of not less than three (3) feet below the grade line of such avenues, streets or sidewalks; that all shut offs, gates and meters shall not extend above the level of the surface of the avenues, streets and sidewalks and shall forever be so maintained; that all fire hydrants shall be so placed within the curb lines and the outside edge of the sidewalk and at such places as shall be designated by the Street Committee of this Borough and the nozzles of such fire hydrants shall be of the uniform standard size of 2 1/2 inches in diameter; that all excavations made shall while open, be protected against animals, vehicles and pedestrians by proper guards during the day time and at night by red lanterns placed at a sufficient distance apart to insure safety to the public; that no excavations made shall be left open for a period of more than one week; that all top soil taken from excavations shall be thrown to one side and upon refilling shall be replaced on top of the fill; that in refilling excavations the ground shall be thoroughly tamped and as often as the ground settles it shall be immediately filled with gravel or shale to its proper level; that all mains and pipes laid in and running parallel with avenues and streets shall be laid not to exceed a distance of ten (10) feet from the gutter lines and far enough from the trees in the sidewalk to cause the least damage thereon; that no avenue or street is to be wholly closed or a part of any laying or repairing of mains or pipes, or from any other cause, but a width sufficiently large to allow the passage of teams and vehicles shall be left at all times; that such water company shall be liable at all times for any and all damages in the event of any injury occasioned by reason of the laying, maintaining and repairing of its mains, pipes, etc., and the use of the avenues and streets and sidewalks for the purposes aforesaid and all things appertaining to the work done, or to be left undone or to be done by the Matamoras Citizens Water Company, its successors or assigns; that such Matamoras Citizens Water Company, its successors or assigns shall pay all the expenses incurred in the enforcement of this ordinance. It is further stipulated that unless the work is in good faith commenced within one year from the passage of this ordinance, that such ordinance will lapse and become void.

Section 3. That before any work shall be done in said Borough by the Matamoras Citizens Water Company, its successors or assigns, shall give a bond, to be approved by this council, in at least a sum of not less than one thousand (\$1000) dollars, for the faithful performance of all the things contained in Section two hereof, and to protect this Borough from damages by reason of such work, repairs, excavations, etc., and all things appertaining to the work done, or to be done or left undone by such water company, its successors or assigns.

Section 4. If such Matamoras Citizens Water Company its successors or assigns shall neglect or refuse to do any of these things required in this Ordinance, such company its successors or assigns shall incur a penalty of not less than fifty (\$50) dollars for each infraction thereof.
