Section 1. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Asse, bly met, That the following are proposed as amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in accordance with the provisions of the sighteenth article thereof:—

Amendment One—To Article Four, Section 2. Amond section eight of article four of the Constitution of Pennsylvania, which reads as follows:—

He shall nominate and, by and with the advice and consent of twe-thields of all the members of the Senate, appoint a Secretary of the Commonwealth and an Attorner General during pleasure, a Superintendent of Public Instruction in four years, and such other officers of the Commonwealth as he is or may be authorized by the Constitution or by law to appoint; he shall have power to fill all vacancies that may beginn in offices to which he

Amendment Three—To Art'cie Five, Section I leven.

Section I Amend section sieven of article five, which reads as follows:—

"Except as otherwise provided in this Constitution, justices of the peace or alder men shall be elected in the several wards, districts, boroughs and townships at it etime of the election of constables, by the qualified electors thereof, in such manner as shall be directed by law, and shall be commissioned by the flowyron for a term of five years. No township, ward, district or borough shall elect more than two justices of the peace or aldermen without the consent of a majority of the qualified electors within such township, ward or berough; no presen shall have readed within the township, borough, ward or district office unless no shall have readed within the township, borough, ward or district for one year next preceding his election in cities mantaluing over fifty thousand inhabitants, not more than one addragan shall be stretced in each ward or district, so as to result—

Amendment Six—To Article Eight.

Section 7. Amend section three of article eight, which reads as follows:—

"All elections for city, ward, borough and township offloors, for regular terms of service, shall be held on the third Tunsday of February." so as to read:—

All judges elected by the electors of the State at large may be siceted at either a general or municipal election, as circumstances may require. All elections for industricts and for county, city, ward, boough and township offloors, for regular terms of service, shall be held on the numbral election day mannely the Tuesday numbral election day have been dead to the mombra of each Honse consenting thereto. Provided That such election shall always be held in an odd numbracy exe.

Amendment Seven—To Article Eight.

Section 8 Amend section fourteen of article eight, which reads as follower:—

"District election beards shall consist of a judge and two inspectors, who shall be selected, and recancies in election here. Each elected, and recancies in election there in the place to a shall appoint one clark. The first election board for any are district shall be selected, and recancies in election from arrest upon days of election, and white engaged in making up and transmitting returns, except upon warrant of a cours of recond ur judge thereof, for an election from the understate they may claim exemption from jury duty during their terms of service.

District election boards shall consist of a judge and two inspectors, who shall be chosen biennially, by the citizens at the municipal election; but the General Assembly may require said boards to be appointed in such ma ner as it may by law provide. Laws regulating the appoint ment of said boards may be enacted to apply to citize

in such manner as may be provided by law.

A mendment Ten—To Article Fourteen, Section II. Amend section seven, article fourteen, which reads as follows:—

"Three con ty commissioners and three county suditors shall be elected in each county where such efficers are chosen, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eventy-five and every third year three-fer; and in the election of said-officers such persons thaving the highest number of votes shall be elected; are quanti vacance in the officer county commissionar or county anditor had be elected; are quanti vacance in the officer county commissionar or county and torchail be filled, by the court of common pleas of the county in which such vacancy shall occur, by the appointment of an elector of the proper county who shall have voted for the county in which such vacancy shall occur, by the appointment of an elector of the proper county who shall have worted for the county in which such vacancy is all occurs of the proper county who shall have worted for the county is the shelled.
