Blood Temperature of Athletes. Professor Plank of the London College Hospital, records some curious observations on the blood temperature of runners. The normal blood temperature in man is about 98.1 degrees Fahrenheit. A young man after a run of 500 yards, showed a temperature of 100.78 degrees; another a temperature of 100.33 degrees; a third a temperature of 102.3 degrees after a run of half a mile. A mile run produced an internal temperature of 102.9 degrees with an outside of 103.2 degrees with another. After a three-mile run one runner had a temperature of 105.4 degrees. But this runner's normal blood temperature was 100 degrees, although he was in perfect health.
