DEADLY WATER OF THE DESERT

Mistake Made by Travelers in the Arid Wastes of the Southwest.

"One of the chief dangers to travelers in crossing such dread and arid wastes as the far famed Death Valley in Nevada arises from ignorance as to the character of the infrequent pools of water along the route," said T. E. Smalley, a mining engineer of Deaver.
