He has been successful in securing substantial appropriations for public improvements here and had he returned it doubt would have succeeded in obtaining yet more. On general principles it is a mistake for constituents to make frequent changes in their representatives. It takes a man some time to form acquaintances among members of the House either at Harrisburg or Washington and to exert an influence which enables him to be of benefit to them. A new member must "learn the ropes" and to do so effectively he must have time to gain experience in the way of legislation. Further to be of the most use to his district he should be of the dominant side, because then his influence will have greater weight, and he will be much more likely to be treated with deference. We do not say this for political effect but because every one must recognize it as a political fact. In many districts it is the custom to return representatives for years, not alone because of their popularity but also because they have acquired familiarity with the ways of doing things, and so can better serve those whom they represent.

L. 1908, page 36), notice is hereby given that the Spring Primary for making various nominations (more specifically designated below) will be held at the election houses in the several election districts of Pike County on the

being the fourth day of said month, between the hours of 8 o'clock p. m. and 5 o'clock p. m.

The State Chairman of the Republican, Democratic and Prohibition parties and the County Chairmen of the Republican and Democratic parties, in accordance with the provisions of Section 2 of said "Uniform Primaries Act," have certified to the County Commissioners the following list of offices to be filled at said primary election:

Republican

One person for Representative in Congress 26th District, comprising the counties of Carbon, Monroe, Northampton and Pike.

One person for Senator in the General Assembly, 14th District, comprising the counties of Carbon, Monroe, Pike and Wayne.

One person for Representative in the General Assembly for the County of Pike.

One person for delegate to the State Convention.

Seven persons for members of the County Committee.

One person for Town Committeeman in each election district in Pike County.

Democratic

One person for Representative in Congress 26th District, comprising the counties of Carbon, Monroe, Northampton and Pike.

One person for Representative in the General Assembly for the County of Pike.

One person for delegate to the State Convention.

Instructions for Candidates

Any person desiring to be a candidate for any of the above offices, excepting Representative in Congress, Senator and Representative in the General Assembly, and have his name printed on the ballot issue file with the commissioners a petition signed by TEN qualified electors of the political district division within which the nomination or election is to be made, setting forth that the signers thereof are members of the party designated. The said petition shall be filed at least three weeks prior to the day of the primary election.

Any person desiring to be a candidate for nomination for Representative in Congress and Senator in the General Assembly must file with the Secretary of the Commonwealth at Harrisburg, Pa., a petition signed by at least TWO HUNDRED qualified electors of the district within which the nomination is to be made.

Any person desiring to be a candidate for nomination for Representative in the General Assembly must file with the Secretary of the Commonwealth a petition signed by at least FIFTY qualified electors of the County of Pike.

The said petitions for Representative in Congress, Senator and Representative in the General Assembly shall be filed at least 28 days prior to the day of the said primary election.
