Instructions for Candidates  
Any person desiring to be a candidate for any of the above offices, excepting Representative in Congress, Senator and Representative in the General Assembly, must have his name printed on the ballot paper with the counties named a petition signed by TEN qualified electors of the political district within which the nomination or election is to be made, setting forth that the signers thereof are members of the party designated. The said petition shall be filed at least three weeks prior to the day of the primary election.

Any person desiring to be a candidate for nomination for Representative in Congress and Senator in the General Assembly, by must file with the Secretary of the Commonwealth at Harrisburg, Pa., a petition signed by at least TWO HUNDRED qualified electors of the district with which the nomination is to be made.

Any person desiring to be a candidate for nomination for Representative in the General Assembly must file with the Secretary of the Commonwealth a petition signed by at least FIFTY qualified electors of the County of Pike.

The said petitions for Representative in Congress, Senator and Representative in the General Assembly shall be filed at least 28 days prior to the day of the said primary election.
