Local Option Address. \$100 Reward, \$100

Judge W. A. Covington of Georgia who made an address here on local option Wednesday evening was met by a large audience. His remarks were wholesome and forceful, and he presented his argument in a manner calculated to impress. Whether one believes in the principle or not they can ill afford to lose the opportunity to hear a good speaker or discuss the problem. The Judge laid stress on the right of the majority in a community to rule. The idea is thoroughly democratic and as people become more intelligent they grow more jealous of their rights, one of the greatest of which is that of determining for themselves by what laws they shall be governed. The fact of this independence is becoming more apparent every day and those politicians who sell closest to the wind of public opinion are the ones who longest retain their leadership. He showed by statistics the prosperity of the Southern States which have gone dry and that abolition of the sale of intoxicants has greatly increased their wealth and prosperity. It does seem strange that the principle of local option should have made such astounding headway in the South, a land that we of the North have been in the habit of regarding rather benighted. But the sentiment is growing and the question is bound to be settled in the near future by the people themselves.

The salmon pack on the Pacific coast this year represents about five and one fourth million cases, making our largest ever recorded. The run of salmon in 1909 was the largest ever known and the fact is not accounted for by the operations of the fisheries. It is suggested that the depletion of the Behring Sea seals which largely live on salmon may in part account for the increase. A seal will eat his weight in salmon every day.
