Prof. John Bascom of Williams College, author of several books, and a rigid advocate of the principle that man's highest good consists in doing right because it is right, was once asked whether he approved the practice of some divines in preaching a doctrine of hell and damnation as the everlasting punishment for sinners. He said he did for no matter how apparently cultured or refined or educated an audience might be there were many who would not be moved to change their evil ways unless through fear of torture in a future state. Possibly the same doctrine applies to those who picture to their hearers the evil consequences of intemperance and other social sins. For the same reasons some newspapers may have printed details of the recent prize fight, in the hope that the barbaric relevation would so awaken public disgust that there would be a strong revulsion of feeling and that form of sport would receive its quietus. Nevada is the only state in which it could have taken place and the notoriety she has received has stirred her better classes to take steps to have laws passed forbidding such brutal exhibitions on her soil. If the wide spread publicity which has been given to the fight tends to accomplish this it will have a more beneficial result in the end than if all mention had been suppressed. Public opinion cannot be changed by withholding information of even's, such course arouses curiosity and keeps the mind speculating as to details. If the facts are known the matter may cause a revulsion of feeling in a healthy mind and the whole subject be the sooner dismissed as disgusting and demoralizing.
