Baselved (if the Senste concur.) That the following amendment to section wenty-six of article five of the Ganstitu tion of Pennsylvania be, and the same takersby, proposed, in secondance with the alghteenth article thereof:—
That section is of Article V., which eads as follows: "election is. All laws elasting to courts shall be general and of aniform op-ration, and the organization, uriselection and powers of all courts of the same olasse or grade, so far a regularity play, and the force and effect of the second name of the fence and effect of the second name of the following the same of the courts of the same and fundaments of such courts, hall be uniform; and the fenceral Assenting after courts to according to the powers wented by this Constitution in the judges of the Courts, be amended so that the same hall read as follows:—
Section 30. All laws relating to courts and live organization, juriantetion, and overs of all courts of the powers of the organization, juriantetion, and

Section 35. All laws relating to course hall be general and of uniform operation, not the organisation, jurisdictum, and overs of all courts of the same class or rade, so far as regulated by law, and the orce and effect of the process and judgments of such course, shall be uniform; at, notwithstanding a cop provisions of the Constitution, the General Assembly hall have full power to establish new ourts, from time to time, as the same may be needed in any city or county, and opreserble the power and jurisdiction hereof, and to increase the number of odges in any cours now existing to here flee created, or to recorganize the same, or vest in other cours the jurisdiction hereofore exercised by courts not of record, and to abolish the same wherever it may be deemed necessary for the orderly and efficient administration of justice. Resolved (if the House of Representative concur.) That the following amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania be, and the same hereby, proposed, in accordance with a eighteenth article thereof.

That section one at article eight be mended, by artiking out the fourth numered paragraph thereof, so that the said ofton shall read as follows:

Section 1. Every male ultimu twenty-be years of age, possessing the full-wing altifications, shall be enatible to vote at a leicetions, milest he entitled to vote at a leicetions ambject however to such faws quiring and regulating the registration electors as the Sceneral Assembly may see.

enact.

First. He shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one month.

Second. He shall have resided in the State one year (or if, having previously been a qualified elector or native-born citizen of the State, he shall have removed therefrom and returned, then six months; immediately preceding the election.

Third, He shall have realised in the election district where he shall offer to vote at least two months immediately preceding the election.

number four, and number fire, but the
number of said courts may be by law increased, from time to time, and shall be in
like manner designated by successive
numbers. The number of judges in any
of said courts, or in any county where
the establishment of an additional court
