The Postal Law

Some subscribers may think that publishers of newspapers are unduly importunate in asking that subscriptions be paid promptly, but if they will read the following ruling they will see the position in which publishers are placed. Every business man, exclusive of newspaper men, is left to his own free will whether to extend credit to his customers or not but the newspapers have no choice. They must comply with the law or lose their business. Here is the ruling: "A reasonable time will be allowed publishers to secure renewals of subscriptions, but unless subscriptions are expressly renewed after the time for which they are paid they will not be counted in the legitimate list of subscribers and copies mailed on account thereof shall not be accepted for mailing at the second class rate of one cent a pound, but may be mailed at the transient rate of one cent for each four ounces or fraction thereof, prepaid by stamps affixed."
