Now offer both of these for sale—the middling animal being as large and handsome as the good one. Let us make a reasonable estimate. It costs \$30 a year to keep a cow, and the produce of a middling one is worth 36 dollars.-Your cow earns you six dollars over and above the keeping But your good cow carns you seven times six!
