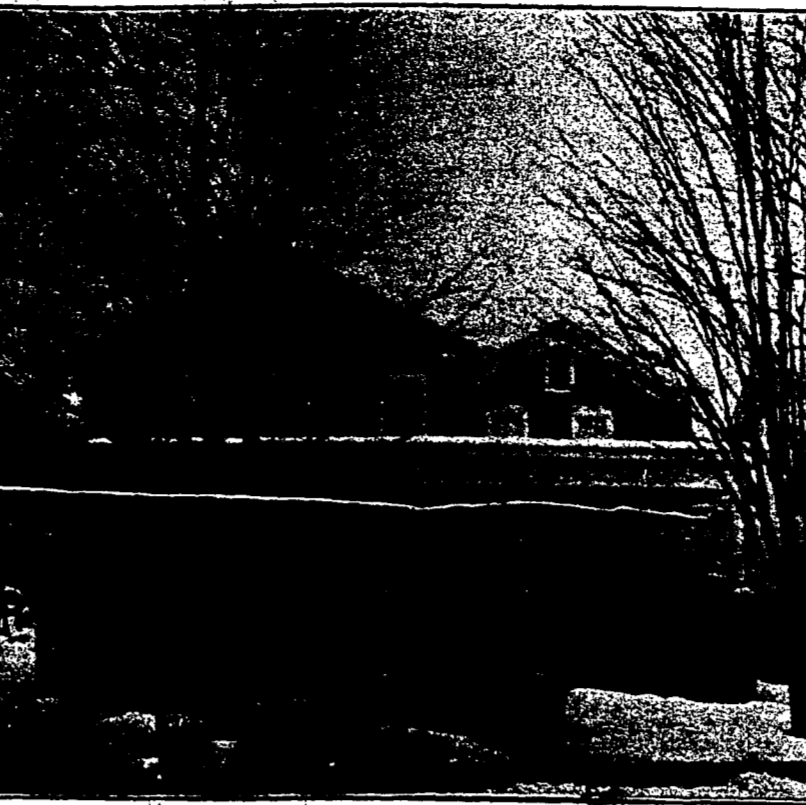

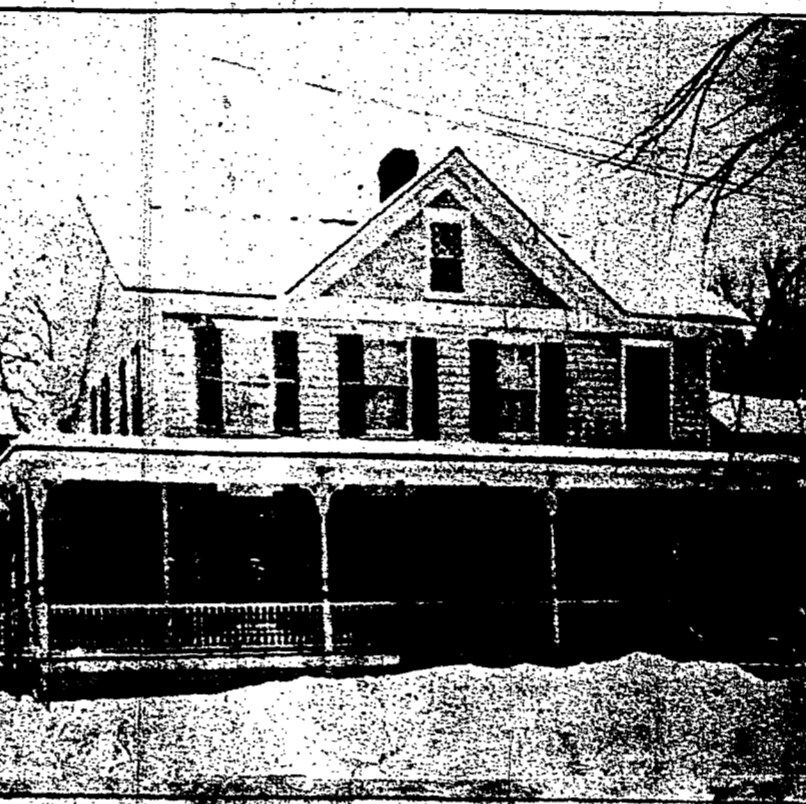

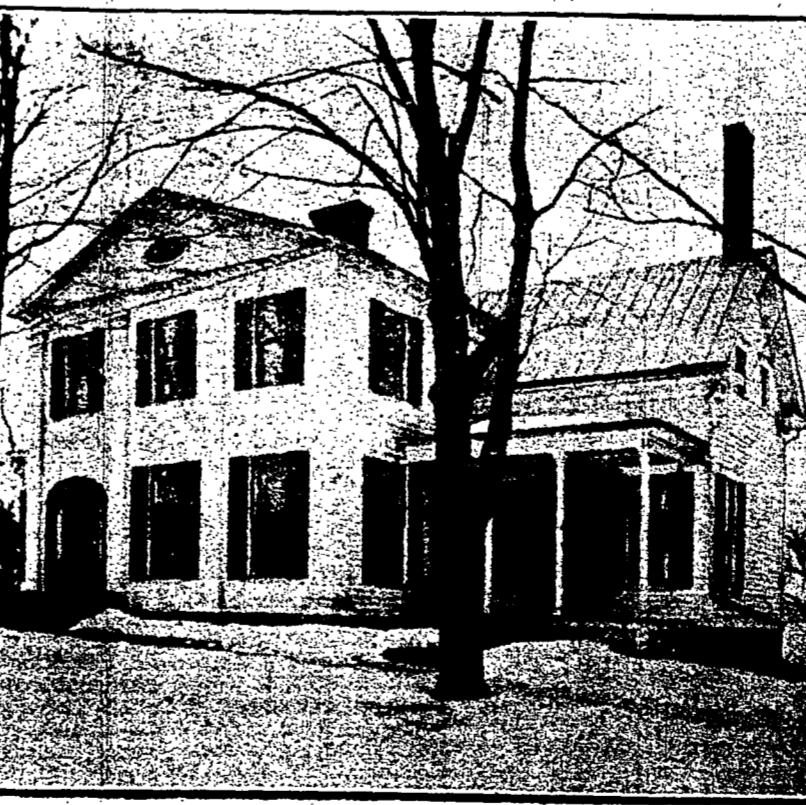
RESIDENCE OF DR. E. R. GARDNER, SOUTH MAIN STREET.
