Through the efforts of L. Buchanan, special American commissioner to Venezuela, a protocol in settlement of the matters between the United States and that country was signed at Caracas, Three American claims go to the Hague tribunal, a fourth was settled by cash payment, and the fifth was settled by the Venezuelan government directly with the claimants.

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
