As to whom the candidate for Governor may be, we care not a pin, so that he is a man fresh from the ranks-a new man. We do not complain of the present incumbent—he has done well idea of his friends rushing wild into his renomination for the sake of the nomination, seems to us to be folly not only, but madness. We speak plain, and desire to be understood; for, in the event of defeat, if he be at our door hat we did not give warning in the hour offdanger.

We are glad that the press throughout the State have got hold of the subject, and that the masses are generally for one term. From what section of the State the nominee may come, or what his name may be we care not, so that he be a new man. In this event all will go to work, and there will he a cheering prospect ahead. But, genthemen, you who disregard the popular warning, do not we be seech you, rely upon the fact that the " Democracy of the State have never been beaten twice in succession. Don't believe that impossibilities are matters of easy access and achievement. At this moment it will require united energy, and every than must be consulted. For a few dictatorial men to say this thing, or that, can be doug is braggadociwonly. Our late defeat should teach us a lesson: a political whirlwind may sweep over the State, thrice more terrible than in October last. If Mr. Shunk were left to himself to act, we have no doubt he would withdraw. His friends are too much interested to be impartial judges. He should think for himslf, and act for the party which elevated him to power. But we have no fears in regard to the result-a non man will be nominated, and he will be elected. If it be not so, then we confess we are mistaken .- Luzerne Dem.
