The republication of this valuable work has been

undertaken partly on account of the high favor with

which it has been received in England, but

chiefly in consideration of its intrinsic value, arising

from the delicious adaptions of the plan to a wide

judgment and fidelity manifested in its execution.—

The idea of giving in a single work, of no very

formidable dimensions, a price which brings it within the reach of very moderate circumstances,

similalr outlines of the history of every nation, is to

enable judicious and appropriate as to serve no

eulogium. Every person who cares at all for the

acquisition of useful knowledge must desire to

possess such a general knowledge of past events, not es-
sentially in own country, but in all countries, as shall

enable him to understand the perpetually recurring

events that are found in almost any course of gen-
eral reading; because for want of such understand-
ing there is always a serious diminution both of

pleasure and profit, even in the perusal of such

works as are designed solely for amusement.—For

instance, most of Sir Walter Scott's novels are found

to be of little value without reference to historical

events and persons, a want of some acquain-

tance with which effects seriously fatigues

the interest and delight they are so well qualified to

awake; and so of most other works belonging to

the better class of what are called light literature.—But

the difficulty has been to obtain this general

knowledge without going through many books, re-
quiring a greater expenditure of time and money than most persons are able or willing to afford; and

such difficulty has been the purpose of

Mr. Mauder's plan.

He has planned the merit of completeness, and is un-
doubtedly the best that could have been desired.—

He gives first a general sketch of ancient and mod-
ern history—a rapid and comprehensive bird's-eye

view, as it were; of the rise and progress of man;

the most important incidents of their career, and

their relations to each other; and after this he takes

up the nations separately, furnishing a concise dis-
cription of all that is important or desirable to know

concerning each, and thus affording a sort of key to

the changed events that were more briefly indi-
cated, rather by their results than their incidents, in

the general sketch or outline. Thus the salient

points of history brought within a manageable

space; and an excellent foundation is laid for

more thorough and extended reading in reference to

any portion of the world, or in any epoch of which a

complete knowledge may be desired.

In the execution of this plan the author has been

very successful. His notices of historical events, the

briefer, are lucid and satisfactory; and he traces

the connection of effect and cause with singular ac-
curacy and ingenuity; thus supplying a very good idea

of the philosophy of history as well as the facts which

history records. In a word, the work will be found

invaluable to the general reader and a very useful

addition to the student.
