BALTIMORE MARKETS.

FLOUR.—The Flour market was quiet but firm to-day. The market may be quoted as closing firm at \$5.62 1/2 for choice brands of Howard Street; \$5.75 for Ohio, \$5.12 1/2 for reg. for regular shipping brands of City Mills Super. Extras are quiet but steady at the quotations below. Baltimore Ground-Flour and Extra are selling at the quotations below. We quote Howard Street Super at \$5.50 1/2; Extra to Fancy do. at \$6.3 1/2; Family do. at \$6.50 1/2.

GRAIN.—Wheat was exceedingly dull this morning. All the offerings changed hands at 138 1/2 cts. for common to fair white; 130 1/4 cts. for good to prime do; and we quote choice whites at 145 1/2 cts., but there was none in market. Reds sold at 125 1/2 cts. for fair to good, and 132 1/2 cts. for prime do., a decline of 2 cts. per bushel. Corn was in pretty fair request, and prices were a shade firmer. Sales were made of some 10,000 bushel at 58 1/2 cts. for common to prime new yellow; 60 1/2 cts. for do. do. white, an advance of 2 cts., and we quote good to prime old yellow at 65.67 cts. and do. old white at 68.70 cts. Oats were rather quiet and prices were a shade firmer. Sales were made of Maryland at 38 1/4 cts. and we quote Pennsylvania at 41 1/4 cts. In Rye there was nothing done, but we quote it nominal at 65.70 cts. for Maryland, and 75 1/2 cts. for Pennsylvania.
