The Confiscation Bill.
The following is the confiscation bill introduced in the House of Representatives by Mr. Bingham, of Ohio, and which has since passed:
Be it enacted, That if any person or persons within any State or Territory of the United States, after the taking effect of this act, shall engage in armed rebellion against the Government of the United States, or shall aid or abet such rebellion, all the property, money, stocks, credits and effects of such persons are hereby declared forfeited to the Government of the United States, and the same are hereby declared lawful subjects of prize and capture wherever found, and the President of the United States shall cause the same to be seized, confiscated and condemned.
Sec. 2. **And be it further enacted,** That such prize and capture shall be condemned in the District or Circuit Court of the United States having jurisdiction of the amount, or in admiralty in any district in which the same may be seized, or into which the same may be taken and proceedings first instituted.
Sec. 3. **And be it further enacted,** That the Attorney General, or any district attorney of the United States in which said property or effects may at the time be, may institute the proceedings of condemnation, and in such cases they will be wholly for the benefit of the United States; or any person may file an information with such attorney, in which case the proceeds shall be for the use of such informer and the United States in equal parts.
Sec. 4. **And be it further enacted,** That every person who shall engage in, or aid or abet such rebellion as aforesaid, shall forfeit all claim which such persons may have to the service and labor of any slave or slaves, and the slave or slaves of such persons shall be and are hereby declared freemen, and forever relieved from such servitude, anything in the laws of the United States or any States to the contrary notwithstanding.
Sec. 5. **And be it further enacted,** That no person shall be arrested or surrendered as a fugitive slave upon the order of any person in the military or naval service of the United States.
