Six Excellent Receipts.

Best Ginger Crackers .- Two pound sot flour, one half pounds of butter, one half pound of sugar, one pint of good molasses, one ounce of ginger; mould very light and roll out thin.

Spanish' Bunns .-- Three pounds o sugar, six ounces of butter, three eggs, one half pint of milk, one pound of flour, one teaspoonful of cream tartah ha f quantity of soda; dissolved in seperate cups. When all is commingled stir fe first the seid, then the soda. Bake in long pans, and when baked, cut in blocks two inches square.

Superior Soda Biscuit - One table spoonful of cream of tartar, one tablespoonful of carbonate of soda, two large table spoonfuls of lard, one pint of sweet milk, one full quart of flour-salt. Mix thoroughly the sodal cream tariar, laid and flour together; then add the milk; work up very lightly; roll out the thickness of one's middle finger, and bake in a quick oven.

College Yeast .- 'To a tinful of hops, add two quarts of boiling water; ler it boil a few minutes, strain it, pour it over enough flour to well scald it. (The paste must he thick enough for a spoon to stand upright in it) Let it cool until milkwarm; then add one lea cuplul of brewer's yeast when risen enough, add two tab'e spoons, De Gat Conttons tul of salt, two of ginger, two of sugar. Half a tin-cupful of this yeast is sufficient for four or five loaves of bread.

Baked Whortleberry Pudding - Four cupfuls of flour, three of sugar, three eggs, one cupful of sour cream, one cupful of butter, one quart of berries, fresh or dried, one tea-spoonful of soda. Mix the soda with the milk, the flour (well sifted) with the sugar and butter; then add the eggs, (well beaten;) lastly the cream.
