The Marvels of a Seed.

Have you ever considered how wonderful a thing the seed of a plant is? It is the miracle of miracles. God said, "Let there be plants vielding seed;" and it is further added, seach one after his kind,"

Consider first their number. About a hundred and fifty years ago, the celebrated January Linnaeus, who has been called the father of botany," recking d about 8 000 different kind of plants; and then he thought that the whole number existing could not much exceed 10,000. But one hundred years February after him. M de Candolle, of Geneva, described 40,000 kinds of plants, and supposed it possibleginat the number might even amount to 100,000.

Well, let me ask you, Have these 100 - March 000 kinds of plants ever failed to bear the right seed? Have they ever deceived us? Has a seed of wheat ever yielded barley, or a seed of poppy grown up into sunflow er? Has a sycamore tree ever sprung from an acorn, or a beach tree from a chest- April nut. A little bird may carry away the small seed of a sycamore in its beak to feed its nestlings, and on the way may drop it on the ground. The tiny seed may spring up and grow where it fell, unnotice May ed, and sixty years after it may become a magnificent tree, under which the flocks of the valley and the shepherds may rest in the shade.

Consider next the wonderful power of June life and resurrection bestoned on the seeds of plants, so that they may be preserved from year to year, and even from century to century.

Let a child put a few seeds into a draw- July er and shut them up, and sixty years afterwards, when his hair is white and h's steps tottering, let him take one of these seeds auff sow it in the ground, and soon after he will see it spring up into new life, and August become a young, fresh and beautiful plant. 1835, several old Celtic tombs were dis covered near Bergorace. Under the head of each of the dead bodies there was found a small square stone or brick, with a hole September in each containing a few seeds, which had been placed there heside the dead by the heathen friends, who had buried them, perhaps 1,500 or 1,700 years before. These seeds were carefully sowed by those who October found them. What was seen to spring from the dust of the dead? Beautiful sunflower, blue corn flowers, and clover, bearing blessom's as bright, and sweet as those which are woven into wreaths by the mer- November ry children now playing in our fields.

Some years ago, a vase hermetically scaled, was found in a mummy pit, in E gypt by the English traveler, Wilkinson, who sent it to the British Museum. Thes libarian there, having unfortunately broken December ii, discovered in it a few grains of wheat and one or two peas, old, wrinkled, and as hard as stones. 
