Milroy's scouts, on the 23d inst., attacked the rear guard of the enemy ten miles east of the Shenandoah mountains; they killed 1 lieutenant and 2 men, and captured a lieutenant and 1 man. None of our men were hurt. The rebel couriers are deserting in large numbers, swearing Unionism, and returning home. Reports from Staunton say the enemy's sick and wounded and large trains of soldiers are passing eastward by rail. Snow fell eighteen inches deep at Monterey on the 20th inst.
