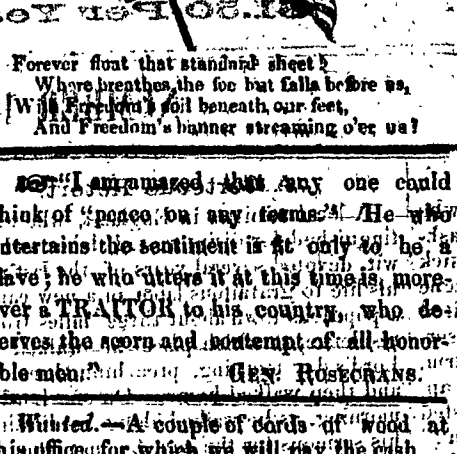

FLOUR.—The Commissary of Subsistence to the 5th Department in the market today for 5,000 lbs. of all ground Western wheat, but we have no inquiry on the part of the trade for super. Prices, which are altogether nominal, we quote as before, viz: Howard Street Super and Cut Extra, at \$6.00; Stimping Extra do. at \$5.25; Family do. at \$5.00.

GRAIN.—Wheat is in fair request only, but prices were sustained. Good to very prime new Southern white wheat quote at 180 @ 190 cents; tough and common do. at 130 @ 175 cents; 1st quality do. Kentucky do. at 165 @ 175 cents; good to prime do. at 150 @ 160 cents; 2d quality do. at 140 @ 150 cents; damp inferior do. at 115 @ 125 cents; and common do. at 90 @ 100 cents.

MEATS.—The attendance of buyers was only fair, and 800 head were offered for sale in the market. The balance of the week were taken from Washington and 500 head by Baltimore butchers, chiefly at prices ranging from 85 @ 100 per head, a decline of 40 @ 60 per lb. on the better descriptions to stock.

Wool.—The offerings of Hogs were large and the demand only fair. Sales of common to prime live Hogs were made at \$7 to \$7.50 per 100 lbs. a decline of 40 @ 60 per lb. on the better descriptions to stock.
