Copies will at once be forwarded to the several Enrolling Officers, at whose houses as well as at Post Offices and other public places they may be inspected.

Any person enrolled may appear before the Board of Enrollment and claim to have his name stricken off the list, if he can show to the satisfaction of the Board that he is and will not be at the time (January 4th) fixed for the next draft, liable to military duty on account of

1st Alliance. 2d Non Residence. 3d Unavailability of Age. 4th Manifest Permanent Disability.

The time for appearing before the Board and claiming to have names stricken off will expire with the 20th of December next, after which day no cases will be heard.

Persons who may be cognizant of other persons liable to military duty, whose names do not appear upon the lists, are requested to notify the Board of Enrollment. All persons enrolled on information thus received are entitled to wait themselves of the privilege of appearing within the time limited and claiming to have their names stricken off, the same as if they had been originally enrolled.

The Board of Enrollment will be in session daily, until the 20th prox, to act on such cases as may be presented.
