BOROUGH ORDINANCE, NO. 20.
WHEREAS, by an act of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, passed the 15th day of August, A. D., 1852, extending the 30th day of April, A. D., 1851 to the Borough of Waynesboro', therefore be it ordained by the Town Council of the Borough of Waynesboro', and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That from and after the 20th day of April, A. D., 1864, That all Fire Wood brought into the Borough of Waynesboro', shall be sold by weight and fractions of a cord, and for that purpose there shall be a Wood Corder and Inspector appointed by the Town Council, who shall have power to appoint deputies, whose duty it shall be to measure every load of Wood brought into the Borough, except only those who have wood land and haul for their own consumption. For which service said Wood Corder, or Inspecter, shall be entitled to receive from the vendor of the wood, Ten Cents per cord.

Any person bringing wood into the Borough and selling it without having it measured, shall forfeit and pay a fine of Fifty Cents for each and every offence, to be recovered on complaint and conviction before the Chief Burgess, the one-half of the fine to be recovered for the use of the Wood Corder and the other half for the Borough.

The Wood Corder and his deputies shall be sworn or affirmed, faithfully to perform the duties required by this ordinance, before he or they proceed to act; and all laws, ordinances or regulations of said Borough as is hereby altered or supplied are hereby repealed. Passed

It yields from two hundred and twenty-five to two hundred and seventy-five gallons of Syrup to the acre. The Cane is best planted on hills. The seed should be sown before planting it.
