White Corn brought an advance of 4 cents, some 4,000 bushels selling at 144@140 cts. Yellow was dull—sales of 3,000 bushels at 150 cents. No transactions in other varieties reported. Virginia and Maryland Oats we quote at 88@74 cents, measure, for very inferior and ordinary; at 78@80 cents for good and prime, and Pennsylvania at 80@90 cents, weight, as to quality. Rye is nominal at 170@178 cents.
