PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 20.—The Flour Market is dull, and prices are drooping. The demand for shipment and home use is limited; sales comprise about 2,000 bbls. including 1,000 bbls. City Mills extra on private terms, and 1,000 bbls extra family at \$11.50@12. The retailers and bakers are buying at from 10.50@11 for superfine, \$11@11.50 for extra, \$11.50@12.25 for extra family, and \$12.50@13.50 bbl. for fancy brands, and to quality. Rye Flour and Corn-Meal are quiet, and there is very little doing in either.
