CEDAR CREEK, Va., 4 P. M.. Oct. 21, 1864. Lieutenant General U.S. Grant, City Point, Va.; I pursued the routed forces of the enemy nearly to Mount Jackson, which point he reached during the night of the 19th or 20th, without an organized regiment of his army. From the accounts of our prisoners who have escaped, and citizens, the rout was complete. About two thousand of the enemy broke and made their way down through the mountains on the left. For ten miles on the line of retreat the road and country were covered with small arms thrown away by the flying rebels, and other debris.

Forty-eight picces of captured artillery are now at headquarters. I think that not either captured or destroyed.

The accident of the morning turned to our advantage as much as though the whole movement had been planned. The only regret I have is the capture in the early morning of from 800 to 1,000 of our men. I am
