

(Special Correspondence to The Press.) CAMP NEAR PETERSBURG, Va., April 10, 1865.

The Present Condition of the City. It is hard to realize the condition of things in Petersburg at present. All that is left of the boastful and defiant rebel army consists of some thousands of broken muskets, many pieces of dismantled artillery, hundreds of buried and unburied bodies, and a long line of empty fortifications.

The city is desolate. The whites have nearly all deserted it. Those that still remain could not get away. That part of the town closer to the works has been riddled with shells and shot, making it uninhabitable. The beauty and elite of the city are scattered among the pines of the upper country.

I went around to the building of the Petersburg Express, but found its doors locked. A fraternal feeling led me to this; but when I went there, I found, if I wished to wag a printer's paw, I would have to wag my own. There are many fine openings here for enterprising "Yanks," and it is predicted that in a few months this city as well as Richmond will be alive with enterprise.

Scarcely any buildings were destroyed by fire. The Slave Pen was filled with cotton. It was fired and burnt to the ground. One tobacco warehouse was burnt, and another fired which failed to burn. The inhabitants, previous to our occupation, were in a starving condition. The negroes say that more food was thrown away by our army before it marched, than the rebel army had for a month. The army was subsisted first, the people last.

KILLING OF MOBLEY, THE GUERRILLA. A letter from Sandy Hook, dated the 15th inst., gives the following information: Mobley, the noted robber and murderer, and right-hand man of Moseby, was shot by a Union soldier on Wednesday afternoon, not far from this place. His body was tied to his horse, said to be a thorough bred animal, and thus driven to Gen. Stevenson's headquarters. The soldier who captured the bandit has been promoted to the rank of major. Mobley was so entirely illiterate that he could not tell one letter of the alphabet from the other. He has robbed and murdered quite a number of the residents of Loudoun county, Va., the aged and the young having been ruthlessly slain by him.
