MISSOURI.

THE NEW CONSTITUTION—THE PRINCIPAL NEW PROVISIONS WHICH THE PEOPLE ARE TO VOTE UPON ON THE SIXTH OF JUNE, 1865.

1. The Constitution, in its first sentence, recognizes our dependence as a people upon Almighty God, the Sovereign Ruler of Nations, for our State Government, our liberties, and our connection with the American Union.

2. It declares Missouri a free State forever. 3. It establishes the equality of all men before the law. 4. It prohibits legislation interfering with the personal rights of men on account of their color.

5. It asserts that all government, of right, originated from the people, is founded upon their will only, and is instituted solely for the good of the whole.

6. It affirms that the people of Missouri are a part of the American nation. 7. It declares that Missouri shall ever remain a member of the American Union.

MARKETS. PHILADELPHIA CATTLE MARKET, April 24.—The arrivals and sales of Beef Cattle are small this week, only reaching about 900 head; the market is dull and prices have declined about 1c lb.

PHILADELPHIA, April 25.—The demand for Flour is limited, both for export and home use, and the market is dull, but holders are rather firm in their views, sales comprise about 1,500 bbls in lots at \$6.85 for extra, and \$8.50 for extra family; the latter rate for high grade Western. The rate

tailors and makers are buying in a small way at from \$7.25 @ 7.75 for superfine, \$8 @ 8.50 for extra, and \$9 @ 11 for extra family and fancy brands, as to quality. Rye Flour and Corn Meal continue dull at former rates.

GRAIN.—Prime Wheat is in fair demand at about previous quotations. Small sales are making at 200 @ 210c per bu. for fair to prime reds; and white at from 220 @ 235c per bu. as to quality. Corn is in demand, and prices are better; about 5,000 bus: sold at from 125 @ 127c afloat, and 125c in the cars. Oats are rather scarce and firmly held; sales are making at \$2 @ 85c per bu.
