Women are more liberal than men. Many a husband grudges his wife a new dress, but few wives are averse to giving their husbands a dressing.

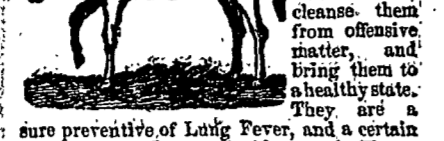

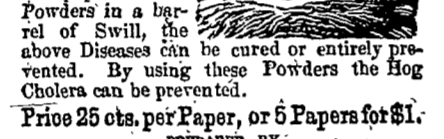

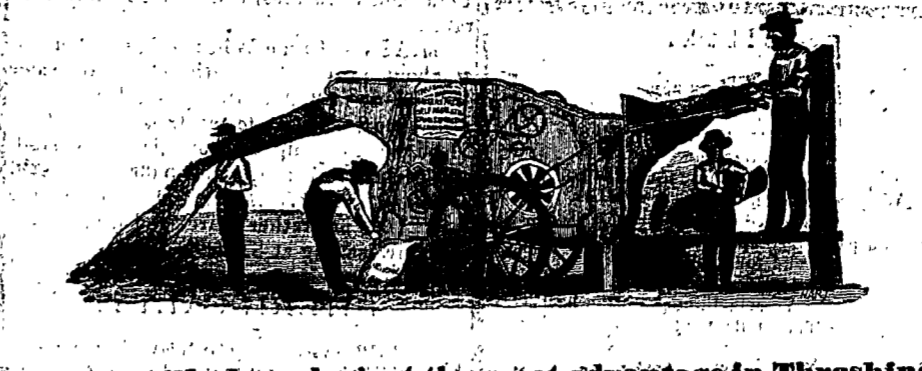
