### EXECUTIVE CHAMBER.

WASHINGTON Uity, May 1, 1865. Whereas, The Attorney General of the United States hath given his opinion that the persons implicated in the murder of the REED, son of Samuel and Sarah Secrist, alate President, Abraham Lincoln, and the attempted assassination of the Honorable William H. Seward, Secretary of State, and in an alleged conspiracy to assassinate other officers of the Federal Government, at Washington city, and their aiders and abettors are subject to the jurisdiction of and legally liable before a military commission;

It is ordered : First, That the Assistant Adjutant General detail nine competent military officers, to serve as a commission for the trial of said parties, and that the Judge Advocate General proceed to prefer charges against the said parties for their alleged ofences, and bring them to trial before the said have noticed for some time past, continues military commission. That the said trial or very dull, and prices are drooping. First trials be conducted by the said Judge Advocate General, and as recorded thereof, in person, aided by such assistant or special judge advocates as he may designate; and that the said trials be conducted with all diligence -consistent-with-the ends of justice, and said commission to sit without regard to hours.

Second, That Brovet Major General Hartranft be assigned to duty as Special Provost Marshal General, for the purposes of said trial and attendance upon the said commission and the execution of its mandates.

Third, That the said commission establish such order or rules of proceedings as may avoid unnecessary delay, and conduce to the ends of public justice. ANDREW JOHNSON.

### SURRENDER OF DICK TAY LOR TO GEN. CANBY.

All the Rebels from the Atlantic to the Mississippi now our Prisoners.

NEW ORLEANS, May 3, via CAIRO, May 8 .- Gen. A. J. Smith, with his command occupied Montgomery, Ala., on the 25th ult., and Gen. Steele occupied Selma on the 27th.

NEW YORK, May 9 .- The Times has a Washington despatch, which says:

"Information was received at army head. quarters to day, of the final and complete surrender of Dick Taylor's forces in Alabama and Mississippi to Ger. Canby. It is a re-markable fact that this news and other despatches from Gen. Wilson were received by telegraph direct from Macon, Ga., to this city. Gen. Wilson is still in Macon, and the telegraph lines through North and South Carolina and Georgia are intact. The escape

of Davis is, therefore, next to impossible. BALTIMORE, May 7.-A gentleman who has just arrived here from North Carolina reports that the rebel troops surrendered by Johnston are greatly demoralized and nearly beyond the control of their officers, who are striving to march them to their respective States. The officers have become the objects of intense hate, and it as much as their lives are worth to venture away from the lines .--Quite a number have been murdered by their soldiers, who seem to be tempted to murder them to get possession of the small sums of specie which the officers are understood to possess. The rebel soldiers express intense feeling against Jeff. Davis and various members of his Cabinet, and there is no doubt that if he or any of the leaders of the rebellion fall into their hands they will fare badly.

PHILADELPHIA, May 9.—There is very lit tle demand for Flour, either for shipment or home use; the market is very dull and prices are drooping; sales comprise about 1,200 barrels fair to choice extra family, at from \$8.-50@9.50 p barrel. The retailers and bakers are buying in a small way, at from \$6.-75@7.50 for superfine, \$8@8.25 for extra \$8.50(@9.50 for extra family, and \$10@11 B barrel for fancy brands, according to quality. Rye flour is selling in a small way at \$5,75(26) \$ barrel. Voru Meal is dull at former rates.

GRAIN -Wheat is coming in more freely and prices are rather lower; about 6,000 bu. sold in lots at from 160(@165c for prime reds, and white at from 210@2200 P bush-as to quality, including 2,000 bus of the latter on private terms.
