A DUTCHMAN'S OPINION OF THE WAR.

MISTER EDITERS:—I s'pose I hef so much rite to say sumthin' as some older men who pays his taxes and sticks up by der constitution. I goes in fer de Union altogether, and don't haf nothin' to do mit tem old Copperheads dat goes round hum-bugging of de bees-ops. Dat ish not my stile—O no! I tells you vot I do. Ven dish war begins to broke out, I calls my son Shorge. "Come here, you Shorge," I sez. He comed. "Shorge," I sez, ten you was a little boy I gives you de name of Shorge Washington, because he vas a good man vot fites for gettin' us. Now, here ish a harder man begun piteven old Uncle Sam and some old raskals, and I wants you to put your gun across your pack and den shoulter your hapsak, and go and fite too, and pe so good a man as vat he vas." Vell, off he goes, an bretty soon dey makes him a gorporal, and now he writes a letter on me and sez he hef a good chance to be made gaptain as soon as his turn komes. My Shorge isn't no gowart. I tell you he vill fite so as ter tnyvel—I see him lick a poy more as haf as pig as hisself. Vell, ven he goes mit de sogers I tell him he shall write home on me and let me know vot he does, and how many pattles dey fite, and how many repels dey don't kill, and how many repels kill dem, and how many men de repels haf, and vat de Sheneral are apout, and vat de gorporals ish apout, and vat Sheff Tavis ish apout, and all apout ef-rythin'. Of gorse, I reads some of deas tings in de papers, but dey ish all lies. I pelceves not more tings from de whole of dem. I tink dey do not know more apit it as I do.

My Shorge is dere rite on de spot, an sees it mit his own eyes; dat ish pette as pain in a sellar; an if he rites some tings I shure is shust so. Vell, py and py he rites me a letter. "My teer fadder," he sez, "I got nothin' to eat." All rite. I send him a box so pig as a pan, full mit sowerkrout and polonies, and dretzels, and kase, and all sich vat ish good. Vell, bretty soon he rites a-madder letter. "My teer fadder," he sez, "I hef no kluthe." All rite. I tells my old yonan, and she send him nice shurts, and stockings, and drawers, and baper kolters more as two men cood lift. Vell, I wait, and auder letter komes. "My teer fadder," he sez, "I hef no money." Dat ish all de news I got from him no but. I kin see how de tings go on bretty vell myself, an I tells you how I tink dis war ish managed. Some feller shumps up and vaults to pe a Sheneral—Kongressmen, contractors an under theeves—and sez, "I goes into a Sheneral." All rite vell. Now, you must speak to de President, and den vat I want. All rite agin; an den dey goes to de President, and sez, "Mister President, here ish a mity smart man, and you shall make him for a nice Sheneral." I haf more Shenerals as I knows rot to do mit, sez de President—"Never mind," dey sez, "dish feller ish a heap smarter dan all of dem," and dey bodder and bodder, till de President he sez, "Go to de tnyvel and make him one Sheneral?
