### RICHMOND.

Escape from Libby of the Brute Turner, its late Keeper.

RICHMOND, May 13, 1865.—It is not without considerable regret that I announce the escape of the notorious Dick Turner from the Libby Prison, on night before last, by breaking or removing one of the iron bars which separated him from the street. This man was one of the under-strappers or keepers of Libby in rebel times, and excelled all the other barbarians in inflicting the most brutal and murderous treatment upon Union prisoners. It is hardly possible for an individual to achieve as much infamy in a similar position as has fallen to the share of Turner. His place of confinement was under ground—his food bread and water, and a sentry was posted before his door to prevent such a misfortune as has taken place. As no guard was in front of the building, on the pavement, it is possible that some assistance was furnished by sympathizing friends from the outside, who offered him shelter and food. The Libby has recently been used as a camp of distribution, and with the exception of Turner, Judge Ould, and Captain Hatch, the Rebel Commissioners of Exchange, no other persons are confined there.

Castle Thunder. Castle Thunder is used by the authorities as the military prison, and affords a secure place for criminals than Libby, having been fitted up for that purpose. It is due to the authorities to state that since Dick's escape, a sentry has been posted in front of his place of confinement. He has not been arrested yet, nor is there much likelihood of his recapture where he has so many hiding places among the rebels of Virginia.

Arrest of Hunter. R. M. T. Hunter, ex-U. S. Senator, was arrested a few days since in Essex county, by a guard sent to look him up. It is not known where he is confined or whether he has been sent.

Governor Pierpont. It is now understood that Governor Pierpont will arrive in this city on the 18th inst. when he will immediately locate his Government here.

Rollins. A farmer in Brattleborough, Vt., has apples, sound and fresh, grown in 1865. They were kept in a cellar, packed in walnut saw dust.

MARKETS. PHILADELPHIA CATTLE MARKET, May 15.—The arrivals and sales of Beef Cattle at Phillips' Avenue Drove Yard reach about 1,200 head; the market is very dull, and prices have declined 1@2c @lb. Extra, Pennsylvania and Western are selling at from 17@18c; a few choice at 20c, fair to good at 18@16c, and common at from 11@12c @lb, as to quality. The market closed very dull, within the above range of prices. Sheep are more active, and prices rather better; 5,000 head sold at from 8c to 11c @lb gross, for sheared and wool sheep. Cows are dull, and rather lower; 105 head sold at from \$27 up to \$80 @ head, as to quality. Hogs continue very dull; 1,500 head sold

at the different yards, at from \$12@14 the 100 lbs. net. PHILADELPHIA, May 16.—There is very little demand for Flour either for export or home use; the market is very dull and prices are fully 25c per barrel lower. The only sales we hear of are in small lots to the retailers and bakers at from \$8.25@8.75 for superfine, and \$7@7.50 for extra; \$7.75@8.50 for extra family, and \$9@10 @bbl. for fancy corns, according to quality. Rye Flour continues dull, and we hear of no sales.—Corn Meal is also dull; Brandywine meal sold at \$5.50 @ bbl.

GRAIN.—The demand is limited, and there is more offering; prices have fallen of 15c @ bushel; about 5,000 bushel, prime Pennsylvania and Delaware red sold at 160c @ bushel, and white at 190@200 @ bushel; choice white is quoted at 200c @ bu. Rye has declined 10c @ bushel; sales are making at 90c. Corn is dull and 20c @ bushel lower, with sales of 7,000 bu. prime yellow at 72@80c @ bushel, closing at the latter rate. Oats are without change; sales are making at 50@52c @ bush.
