MARKETS.

PHILADELPHIA CATTLE MARKET, June 19.—The arrivals and sales of Beef Cattle at Phillips Avenue Drove Yard reach about 1,800 head this week. The market continues very dull, and prices have declined to 12 1/2 lb, with sales of extra Pennsylvania and Western Steers at 17 1/2 lb, fair to good at 14 1/2 lb, and common at from 12 1/2 to 13 1/2 lb, as to quality. The market closed very dull, and sales of common Western Cattle were reported at rather lower prices than the above.

Sheep have advanced; 4,000 head arrived, and sold at from 6 1/2 to 7 1/2 lb gross. Cows are unchanged; 110 head sold at from \$25 up to \$80 head, as to quality. Hogs continue dull; 2,100 head sold at the different yards at from \$11 to \$13 the 100 lbs net.

PHILADELPHIA, June 20.—The produce markets are very dull to-day, and prices are unsettled and drooping, owing to the decline in gold. Flour is very quiet. Wheat and Corn has declined. Corn is without change. Cotton is in fair demand, but prices are rather lower.

The Flour market continues very dull, and holders are more anxious to sell. The only sales we here of are in small lots to the retailers and bakers, at from \$6 to \$6 50 per bbl. for common to good superfine, \$6.75 to \$7.50 for extra, \$7.75 to \$8.75 for extra family, and \$9 to \$10.50 per bbl for fancy brands, as to quality. Rye Flour and Corn Meal continue dull at about previous quotations.

GRAIN.—There is very little demand for Wheat, and prices have fallen off about 3,000 bushels sold in lots to the millers at from 175 to 180c bushel for fair to prime reds, and white at from 200 to 220c bush, as to quality. Rye is selling in a small way at 90c bush. Corn is dull, small sales of prime yellow are making at 98c bush. Oats have declined.
