MARKETS.

PHILADELPHIA—CATTLE MARKET, July 24.—The arrivals and sales of Beef Cattle at Phillips' Avenue Drove Yard reach about 1,400 head this week; the market is dull and prices rather lower. Extra Pennsylvania and Western are selling at 15@16 1/2; fair to good at 12@14; and common at 10@11 1/2 lb, as to quality.

Cows are without change; about 100 head sold at from \$25@55 for Springers, and \$30@75 for head for Cows and Calf.

SHEEP.—The demand is good, and prices are rather better; 5,000 head arrived and sold at from 6@6 1/2 lb, gross, as to condition.

Hogs.—About 1,900 head arrived and sold at the different yards at from 15@16 the 100 lbs, net, according to quality.

PHILADELPHIA, July 25.—Holders of Flour are firm in their views, but there is very little doing in the way of sales; 1,000 bbls extra family sold at \$8@8.25 @ bbl, and a small lot fresh-ground Lancaster county do at \$8 7/8. The retailers and bakers are bakers are buying in a small way at from \$8.15@8.50 for superfine; \$7@7.50 for extra; \$8@8.75 for extra family, and \$9@10 @ bbl for fancy brands, as to quality. Rye Flour and Corn Meal are without change.

GRAIN.—Wheat is in steady demand at the advance, with sales of about 12,000 bus. at 182@190c for good to prime old Reds; new Delaware do. at 170@180c, and small lots of White at 205c. Rye is selling in a small way at \$1.10. Corn is scarce; small sales of prime yellow are making at 95c @ bu. Oats are dull and lower; sales of 3,000 bus at 60@63c, including a lot of new at 50@53c @ bu.
