MARKETS.
PHILADELPHIA CATTLE MARKETS, July 31.—The arrivals and sales of Beef Cattle at Phillip's Avenue Drove Yard reach about 1,300 head this week; the market is dull at former rates, with sales of first quality Pennsylvania and Western Steers at from 15@16; fair to good at 13@14; and common at from 11@12; @ 13 lb, as to quality; the market closed very dull within the above range of prices.

Cows are without change; 120 head sold at from \$25 up to \$75 @ head as to quality. Sheep are more active; 8,000 head arrived and sold at from 6@6 1/2 @ lb, gross, as to quality.

Hogs.—Prices are rather better; 2,000 head arrived and sold at the different yards at from \$15@16.75 the 100 lbs, net.

PHILADELPHIA August 1.—The Flour market is rather quiet at former rates; sales comprise about 1,200 bbls, in lots, mostly to the retailers and bakers, at from \$7@7.25 for superfine, \$7.50@8 for extra, \$8.02@8.75 for old stock extra family, \$9@9.50 for fresh ground, and \$10@11 @ bbl for fancy brands according to quality. Rye Flour is selling at \$5.50 @ bbl. Cornmeal continues quiet, and we hear of no sales.

GRAIN.—There is more Wheat offering, and prices have declined, with sales of about 8,000 bushels at 200@215c for prime old reds, closing at the former rate, and 200c per bushel for new do. In white there is nothing doing. Rye is selling in a small way at 105@110c per bushel for new and old. Corn is lower; 4,000 bushels yellow sold at 100@105c, closing at the lowest figure. Oats are rather quiet; 3,000 bushels sold at 55c for new, and 70c per bushel for old.
