Frank Gurley, the murderer of Gentral Robert McCook, is to be executed at Huntsville, Alabame, on Friday. Dec. 21, by order of the War Department.

President Johnson has restored the writ of habeas corpus to all the states, with the exception of the Southern states; the District of Columbia, and the Territory of New Mexico and Arisona.

Congress -The first session of the thirly-ninth Congress commenced at noon on Monday last. The Senate was called to order by Mr. Stockton and the session opened with prayer. The credentials of Hon. Luke P. Poland, elected to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Mr. Collamor, were presented; and he took his seat. Hon. Mr. Stockton took his seat as a Senator from New Jersey. After the introduction of several important bills the Senate adjourned.

The House was called to order by the blerk, who read the roll of menibors, omitting those from the States lately in rebellion. One hundred and seventy-five persons answered to their names. Schuyler Colfax of Indiana, was elected speaker. A resolution declaring Mr. McPherson Clerk, Mr Ordway Serguant at-Arms; Mr. E. Goodenow Doorkeeper, and Mr. Given Postmaster; until their successors were elected, passed.

The President's Message was read in the Senate and House on Tuesday. The document is too lengthy for our columns entire. but we will give a synopsis of its contents in our next issue. According to the notices given it in the city dailies the Message is frank and patriotic, and favorably regarded
