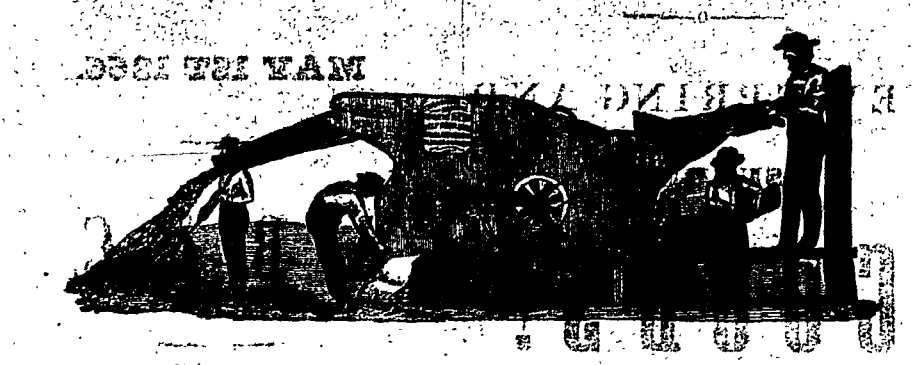

This Machine is conveniently arranged for hauling and thrashing, being permanently fixed on two wheels. One man can easily move or shift it about, so that it is not half trouble in a barn floor as a common thrasher and shaker. It is also easily put in operation. It is simple, easily managed, reliable, durable, compact and light to work by when in operation, not making near the dust as the common machine or other Separator.

The trunk and fan sides being closed, to confine the straw and chaff, remedies all difficulties in cleaning grain against wet weather.
