1st. Act of July 28th, 1866, additional Bounty to soldiers of 1861, '62 and '63.

2nd. Supplementary Pension Act, June 6th, 1866, increasing pensions of Invalids to \$15, \$30 or \$25 per month, and giving pensions to Fathers, Brothers and Sisters.

3rd. Pension Act, July 25th, 1866, giving \$2 per month additional for each child of soldiers who are under 15 years of age, also to orphan children.

4th. Act of July 26th, 1866, Bounties and Pensions to colored soldiers and heirs.

5th. Gratuity and annuity to soldiers of 1812, and their widows, by Act of Pennsylvania Legislature of March 30, 1866, also claims for commutation of rations, other Pensions, Bounty and Arrears of pay, claims in Quartermaster and Commissary General Departments, &c., &c. Recollect that I am authorized to collect claims for all persons, no matter what State they reside in, except the State gratuity above named.
