A number of distinguished individuals have been named for the office, most prominent among whom are Hon. Thad Stevens. Gov. Curtin, and Simon Cameron

LOOKING AFTER THE PRESIDENT .- On Wednesday week, when the General Appropriation bill came up in the House of Representatives, a motion was made to strike out the appropriation for the President's "par-.don clerk," which was adopted. An amendment was also offered, providing that Collectors and Assessors of Internal Revenue not appointed to fill a vacancy caused by death or resignation, should not be entitled to receive any salary or emolument of their office unless confirmed by the Senate. The amendment prevailed. "These are bitter pills, but the Doctor says they must be taken."

Mudd, Spangler, and the other assassination conspirators now at the Dry Tortugas, have friends at court. The -people_of Baltimore, that is, those who stoned Union troops as they passed through that city to defend the national capital have sent two lawyers to the President to plead, the cause of Liucola's murderers, and insist on their unconditional release. Had two damsels been employed to scoure this release, there might have been some fear entertained that the murderers would be set free; and even as the case is represented, if it can be proven that the prisoners hate Congress and glorify Jehnson, their pardon is sure.

The brutal troatment of the freedmen, practiced by their former masters, has at length attracted the deserved attention of Congress. A bill has been introduced in the Senate, to put a stop to the outrages in the shape of corporeal punishment now practiced in the South. The whipping post, the lash and the raw hide are as much in requisition in the once slave States as when slaare horribly beaten for the most trivial offenses They are tortured with a refinement of cruelty which far excels the revolting bru talities of the inquisition. Every traitor's hand is against the freedmen. He is assail ed by men who show their hate of the government by striking at him; and therefore it is the duty of the authorities to protect its friends against its enemics.

Immediately after the holidays, the bill to reimburse the loyal States for war expenses will be reported for action by Representative Blaine of Maine. The proposition is to give a certain amount of five per cent. United States bonds to each State; equal in amount to fifty-five dollars for each volunteer furnished by said State. As Pennsylvania furnished the round number of 200,-000 fighting men, she will just be entitled to \$11,000,000.

The Attorney General was directed to make out a list of the pardons on file in his office granted by President Johnson .-It will take some months to propare the list, as he says there are now SEVENTEEN THOU-SAND on file! It would save a clerk's pay, if President Johnson would just pardon the "reconstructed" in a mass. He might as well resort to that method, as he is evidently doing it by piece meal. The House of Representatives appears to think a clerk can be dispensed with.
