

This Machine is conveniently arranged for hauling and thrashing, being permanently fixed on two  
 wheels. One man can easily move or shift it about, so that it is not half trouble in a barn floor as a  
 common thrasher and shaker. It is also easily put in operation. It is simple, easily managed, durable,
